ATTACHMENT 1: ENRICHMENT IDEAS

The internet is FULL of enrichment ideas – just remember: Your dog decides what's enriching, not you. The internet may say a sniffy walk around the neighborhood is an excellent form of enrichment, but if your foster is too nervous to enjoy his/her time out .. it's just stressful. Tailor all exercises so that your dog is excited to participate!

Paws In Thrift (16040 W National Ave, New Berlin, WI 53151) has LOTS of enrichment toys/mats - please stop in and let them know you are a foster and they'll provide you with the supplies! Make sure to check facebook for their open hours.

Physical / Exercise	 Neighborhood walk Make a flirt pole (stick or PVC + rope + toy) for chasing games Indoor obstacle course using cushions, boxes, broom handles, tunnels made from chairs & towels Tug toy from braided old T-shirts, fleece, or rope strips (knotted ends) Long line walk in a field Swimming In open water, dog must wear a life preserver, and area must be contained and/or the dog remains on a long line Make sure the water is safe for swimming (No large waves, no algae/bacteria concerns, temperature is appropriate, etc.) Dogs can die from ingesting too much water. Keep sessions short, especially for enthusiastic dogs. 	• Agility classes

Cognitive / Problem Solving	 Muffin tin puzzle: place treats in cups, cover some with tennis balls or crumpled paper Cup / shell game (hide treat under one of multiple cups) Roll food in a towel or in crumpled paper layers and let dog unroll it Puzzle box: nest boxes or folded cardboard hiding treats inside 	 Commercial puzzle feeders (e.g. sliding puzzles, rotating puzzles) Treat-dispensing balls or cubes Interactive puzzle boards / "snuffle" feeders with compartments IQ / brain-training toy sets

Food / Meal Enrichment	 Scatter feeding: instead of a bowl, scatter kibble in grass or around a room Multiple bowls / hidden bowls: divide meal into portions and hide in different places, maybe under blankets or behind furniture DIY treat dispenser: plastic bottle with holes, covered in a sock for softness, so dog rolls to get kibble out Busy box: fill a box with treats hidden within shredded paper inside the box 	• Slow feeder bowls (maze style) • Kong (stuffable) or other hollow chew / treat toy • Treat-dispensing puzzles • Feed-through puzzles / feeding mats

Social / Bonding / Interaction	 Hide-and-seek: you or a family member hide and call the dog to find you (use cues like "where are you?") Training games (learning new tricks, placing, targeting) Tug + fetch sessions alternating with rest "Clean up" game: have the dog pick up toys and put them into a basket (fun "job") Canine Fitness - contact info@twoleftfeetcaninefitness.com to schedule a session Pack walk with other dog-friendly dogs 	 Interactive tug toys (that resist / have texture) Remote-controlled flirt pole / teaser with handle "Automatic" toys you can trigger remotely Puzzle + interaction hybrids (e.g. you trigger, they fetch / solve) Training classes Training classes may be covered by FoM/MADACC based on necessity.
